**Italian Drawings: Highlights from the Collection**  
to 10 July  
Mellon Gallery (13)

This exhibition celebrates the highlights of the Fitzwilliam's Italian Drawings collection. See works by some of the greatest Italian masters: Leonardo da Vinci, Michelangelo and Raphael, the Carracci, Guercino, Titian, Tintoretto and Veronese, Correggio and Parmigianino, Maratti, Passeri and the Zuccari, Barocci, Vasari, Polidoro da Caravaggio, Perino del Vaga, Salvator Rosa, Giambattista Tiepolo, Giandomenico Tiepolo, Francesco Guardi, Ribera, Sabatelli and Modigliani.

Also included are sketchbooks by Stefano della Bella, Agnese and Carlo Dolci. This exhibition has been mounted to mark the publication of the new catalogue of the Italian Drawings collection.

**Flower Drawings: Redouté and his Pupils**

The 'Raphael of flowers', Joseph-Pierre Redouté (1759-1840), internationally famous for his prints of roses and lilies, was the finest botanical draughtsman of his age. He worked for both Marie-Antoinette and the Empress Joséphine.

His school of botanical drawing in Paris had over 80 pupils, the majority of them women, several of whom became professional painters of flowers whose work is shown here.

The exhibition celebrates the recent acquisition of Julie Ribault's watercolour, painted in 1830, of Redouté's school of botanical drawing in the Salle Buffon of the Jardin des Plantes, exhibited here for the first time since it was shown at the Paris Salon of 1831.

**Splendour & Power: Imperial Treasures from Vienna**

Come prepared to be dazzled by this glittering exhibition of jewellery, vessels and small-scale masterpieces from the Imperial Treasury in Vienna, displayed together for the first time in the UK.

See Renaissance and Baroque treasures, all exquisitely fashioned from precious metals, gems, rare stones and other exotic materials.

Designed to demonstrate the incredible wealth and power of the Holy Roman Emperors, these remarkable creations were the pride of the Royal Family and were only shown to select visitors of noble birth.

Don't miss this rare glimpse into the opulent world of the Hapsburg Dynasty.

**Italian Etchings: The draughtsman's print**

Etching was a print technique developed in the sixteenth century, which gave artists the facility to make printing plates without years of specialist training or collaboration with a professional engraver. The artist could draw directly onto the plate as easily and effectively as drawing on paper.

Designed to complement the exhibition of *Italian Drawings*, this exhibition of prints from the Fitzwilliam's collection features artists from the 16th to the 18th centuries including Parmigianino, Guido Reni, Castiglione, Salvator Rosa, Giambattista Tiepolo and Canaletto.

**Treasure Under Your Feet**

From a prehistoric torc and a Tudor jewel to Viking hack-silver and gold coins of the Civil War, the discovery of ancient treasure inspires great excitement.

The exhibition draws on public and private collections in the region, as well as from the Fitzwilliam's own holdings.
